NANCY CHOCKLEY, MBA is the founding President and CEO of the National Institute for Health Care Management (NIHCM) and NIHCM Foundation, and has led the organizations since their inception in 1993, steering them through one of the most interesting decades of health care policy. She has spearheaded NIHCM Foundation's work in obesity, pharmaceuticals, prevention, children's health and the uninsured. Ms. Chockley is a national voice in the health care arena and has been featured on many broadcasts such as ABC World News Tonight, NBC News, BBC and CNN, and in numerous print outlets such as *The Wall Street Journal*, *The New York Times*, and *The Washington Post*. Ms. Chockley received her M.B.A. in 1983 and her BA, with Distinction in Economics, in 1980 from the University of Virginia. Prior to founding NIHCM, Ms. Chockley was a principal in the Strategy Practice of Mercer Management Consulting where she had worked with a variety of industries, including health care and pharmaceuticals, since 1985. Her experience spans the areas of business strategy development, best practices benchmarking and strategy implementation.

KATHRYN SANTORO, MA, is a Program Manager at NIHCM Foundation. Ms. Santoro manages two grants with the Health Resources and Services Administration's Maternal and Child Health Bureau (MCHB), where she is responsible for research and policy analysis of issues related to maternal, child and adolescent health. Ms. Santoro joined NIHCM Foundation in September 2004 after receiving her Master's degree in Public Policy from the George Washington University with a focus on women's health policy. Ms. Santoro also previously worked for Women in Government/Digene Corporation as a Project Consultant compiling a state-by-state report card on access to cervical cancer screening. While pursuing her Master's degree, Ms. Santoro worked for a health policy consulting firm as a Communications Assistant and as a Graduate Intern for a Washington, D.C. based women's and children's policy research organization. Ms. Santoro attended Villanova University in Villanova, PA and graduated with a BA cum laude in Political Science in 2002.

JAMES M. PERRIN, MD, FAAP is professor of pediatrics at Harvard Medical School and director of the Division of General Pediatrics and the Center for Child and Adolescent Health Policy at the Massachusetts General Hospital for Children, a research and training center with an active fellowship program in general pediatrics. He chaired the American Academy of Pediatrics Committee on Children with Disabilities and is past president of the Ambulatory Pediatric Association. For the American Academy of Pediatrics, Dr. Perrin also co-chaired a committee to develop a practice guideline for attention deficit hyperactivity disorder.

A graduate of Harvard College and Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine, he had his training in pediatrics at the University of Rochester and has been on the pediatric faculties of the University of Rochester and Vanderbilt University, with an additional appointment at the Institute for Public Policy Studies at the latter institution. He has mentored fellows both at Vanderbilt and at the Massachusetts General Hospital. His research has examined asthma, middle ear disease, children's hospitalization, and childhood chronic illness and disabilities, with a recent emphasis on studies of the Supplemental Security Income Program for children and adolescents and patterns of care for children with chronic illness.

Dr. Perrin is the founding editor of *Ambulatory Pediatrics*, the journal of the Ambulatory Pediatric Association. He served on the Institute of Medicine's Committees on Maternal and Child Health under Health Care Reform and on Quality of Long-Term-Care Services in Home and Community-Based Settings, the National Commission on Childhood Disability, and the Disability Policy Panel of the National Academy of Social Insurance (Chair, Children's Committee). He served as a member of the Health Care Technology study section of the Agency for Health Care Policy and Research and is currently a member of the National Advisory Council for the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality. He recently served on the IOM Committee on Quality in Long Term Care and is currently a member of the IOM Committee for the Evaluation of Selected Federal Health Care Quality Activities. He co-chairs the Child and Adolescent Health Measurement Advisory Committee.

JOSEPH F. HAGAN, JR., MD, FAAP is clinical Professor in Pediatrics at the University of Vermont College of Medicine and the Vermont Children's Hospital. He is Co-Author of *The Bright Futures Guidelines for Health Supervision of Infants, Children and Adolescents, Third Edition*, published by the American Academy of Pediatrics. He has served as an Advisory Board member to the Maternal and Child Health Benefits Study by the National Business Group on Health.

Dr. Hagan is Past-Chairperson of the American Academy of Pediatrics Committee on Psychosocial Aspects of Child and Family Health and Chaired the Academy's Task Force on Terrorism. He Chairs the Vermont Citizen's Advisory Board (VCAB) for the Vermont Agency of Human Services Department for Children and Families. Dr. Hagan practices primary care pediatrics in Burlington, Vermont.

JULIE KOZLOWSKI, RN, BA, is a Registered Nurse with twenty-six years of experience, including past experience in Critical Care, Operating Room, Infusion Therapy Home Care and Long Term Care. She began her career with HealthNow NY Inc. d/b/a BlueCross Blue Shield of Western New York and BlueShield of North Eastern New York in 2001 and has been a Corporate Program Coordinator in Medical Services since 2003..
